VISITORS GUIDE

BETWEEN

TWO WORLDS



Welcome to the Vilna Shul! This century-old synagogue, established by Boston's Vilna landsmanshaft (community organization for recent Jewish immigrants), collapses worlds both Old and New. It brings together Orthodox Judaic practices, 19th century European architectural styles, Eastern European traditional synagogue muraling, and mid-19th century American Baptist church benches. A true American amalgam, from across and between worlds.

THE VILNA SHUL

As you sit in these pews, enveloped by the towering ceiling and arched windows, we invite you on a journey that braids together multiple intersections of time, Jewishness, and Vilna (Yiddish for Vilnius). While the Jewish community who settled in Boston in the late 19th century were fleeing Czarist restrictions, by 1897, the 40% Jewish population in Vilna also supported a bustling Jewish metropole. It was there that the Vilna Troupe, a scrappy young band of enthusiastic Yiddish performers committed to elevating the Yiddish theatre, formed in 1915 amidst the loosened restrictions on Yiddish performance during WWI. Shortly after, they became diasporic Vilners themselves, re-settling in the Yiddish cultural center of Warsaw.

The cornerstone for this building was laid in December 1919, it was completed in 1920. By chance — or perhaps bound through divine relation — this timeline also traces a legendary Vilna Troupe premiere. In November 1920, the troupe's director declared at the gravesite of Yiddish activist S. Ansky (Shloyme Zayvil Rapoport) that the Vilners would perform An-sky's mystical masterpiece following the traditional thirty days of mourning. The play, The Dybbuk; Between Two Worlds, a tragic love story in a turn-of-the-century shtetl, was inspired by An-sky's 1912–1914 ethnographic mission through the Pale of Jewish Settlement. Premiering December 9, 1920 in Warsaw, the play caused a sensation: the production possessed audiences so strongly that it was said that dybbuks had taken over Poland's thriving capital city. →



THE VILNA SHUL

From your seat, on the eastern and western walls to your right and left, and across the ceiling above you, are visible the original murals that once adorned so much of this space. Hidden for decades under coats of paint, as the shul was renovated once it became landmarked in 2000, the unmasking uncovered this delightful, colorful feature – a uniquely Eastern European touch. From these portals into the past, you may just glimpse an apparition. A familiar form – a friendly Vilner – might just cut a shape across this magical stage.

Last fall I visited The Vilna Shul and I immediately felt surrounded by all the immigrants that traveled to that slope on Beacon Hill, from Vilna and other places across Eastern Europe in the late 1800s and early 1900s, those who built that building, and those who have lived and breathed inside its walls since. Looking at the partially uncovered murals, the old pickle barrels that hold portions of the Torah, the stained glass windows with light filtering in, and lists of Hebrew names on the walls, I could feel them all there with me - their love, their loss, their resilience, the displacement, the joy. In this terrible time in our country and our world, nothing feels more needed than to gather our many communities - our artists, the Boston theater community and audiences, our immigrant communities, the Jewish community, the members of today's Vilna Shul, those who live and work near Beacon Hill and beyond - to gather in this sacred space and share an epic and fantastical tale of love, yearning, and the restless spirits that lie between us, and between worlds.





Welcome to The Vilna Shul, Boston's Center for Jewish Culture! We spark excitement and curiosity about Jewish culture and our American immigrant story through vibrant and meaningful experiences.

In the 1880s, immigrants from the present-day city of Vilnius, Lithuania ("Vilna" in Yiddish) - set sail for America and built a new life for themselves right here on Beacon Hill. By the 1920s, this neighborhood became the epicenter of Boston Jewish life and was adorned by more than 50 synagogues.

This historic synagogue building is the only surviving landmark of Boston's immigrant Jewish past and has since been transformed into an urban hub for Jewish arts and culture.

Igor Golyak (Director, Scenic Design) is the founder and producing artistic director of Arlekin Players Theatre & Zero Gravity (zero-G) Theater Lab in Boston. He most recently directed the New York premiere of Our Class by Tadeusz Slobodzianek at Brooklyn Academy of Music (BAM), a featured production of the 2024 Under the Radar Festival, which will transfer to Classic Stage Company off-Broadway in Manhattan September 2024, along with his adaptation of The Merchant of Venice. In 2022, Golyak conceived and directed The Orchard starring Mikhail Baryshnikov and Jessica Hecht off-Broadway, which then toured to Boston. A global leader in the virtual theater movement, he directed Just Tell No One, part of the Worldwide Ukrainian Play Readings/ CITD, at Lincoln Center featuring Jessica Hecht, Bill Irwin and David Krumholz, and directed virtual elements of the Sasha Denisova's The Gaaga (US premiere). During the pandemic, he conceived and directed Witness, chekhovOS /an experimental game/ and State vs. Natasha Banina, each of which became an international virtual theater sensation, receiving multiple New York Times Critics Picks. His work has been recognized with Elliot Norton Awards for The Gaaga, The Orchard, The Seagull, The Stone, and A Dead Man's Diary, including a special Citation for extraordinary artistic innovation during the pandemic. Golyak is a 2023 Mandel Fellow and winner of a Broadway World's Best Director Award and multiple This Week In New York Pandemic Awards. He directed The Merchant of Venice for Actors' Shakespeare Project and has directed and taught at Northeastern University, HB Studios, Boston Conservatory, the Russian Academy of Theatre Arts/Middlesex University, Moscow Specialized Institute for the Arts, and the ARBOS Theatre Festival. Golyak is from Ukraine and received a master's degree in directing from the Russian Academy of Theatre Arts and an acting degree from Moscow's Schukin Theatre Institute (Vakhtangov Theater). With his producing partner Sara Stackhouse and the Arlekin company, he launched an #ArtistsforUkraine initiative days after the war began, and, after October 7, launched a Jewish Plays initiative. His company Arlekin, a company of immigrants, has performed all over the world, including festivals in Ukraine, Yerevan, Romania, Armenia, New York City, Chicago, Lviv, Monaco, the US, Canada and UK, as well as the Moscow Art Theatre.

Sara Stackhouse

Producer

Sara Stackhouse (Producer) is a creative producer and specialist in strategy and organizational development. She is producing director of Arlekin Players Theatre & Zero Gravity (zero-G) Theater Lab in Boston. She most recently co-executive produced the New York premiere of Our Class by Tadeusz Slobodzianek at Brooklyn Academy of Music (BAM), a featured production of the 2024 Under the Radar Festival, which will transfer to Classic Stage Company off-Broadway in Manhattan September 2024 where she will also executive produce Igor Golyak's adaptation of The Merchant of Venice. In 2022, Stackhouse co-executive produced The Orchard starring Mikhail Baryshnikov and Jessica Hecht off-Broadway, which then toured to Boston. She produced Just Tell No One, part of the Worldwide Ukrainian Play Readings/CITD, at Lincoln Center featuring Jessica Hecht, Bill Irwin and David Krumholz, and versions of the same production at The Huntington Theatre and at Arlekin's studio. She produced the US premiere of Sasha Denisova's The Gaaga, which won two Elliot Norton Awards. During the pandemic, she produced Witness, chekhovOS /an experimental game/, and the international virtual tour of State vs. Natasha Banina which were worldwide viral sensations and received multiple New York Times Critics Picks. She is co-founder of BroadBand Collaborative, and founder and creative director of The Mama Project, an intercultural project for women in South Africa. She was project manager for cellist Yo-Yo Ma for many years where she was on the producing team for the award winning Yo-Yo Ma: Inspired By Bach, a documentary and performance series featuring collaborations with artists across six artistic disciplines and five countries. With Ma, she also managed collaborations with artists Bobby McFerrin, Mark Morris, Wynton Marsalis, Tamasaburo Bando, Tan Dun, Toni Morrison, Mark O'Connor and others. As Executive Producer of Actors' Shakespeare Project for over a decade, she produced 48 productions and stewarded the organization from its founding into an award-winning company (Elliot Norton, IRNE, American Theater Wing Awards). She served as Chair of Theater at Boston Conservatory during the merger with Berklee College of Music. Clients have included the Silkroad, Massachusetts Cultural Council, ArtsBoston, Boston Baroque Orchestra, MACS, MIT Media Lab, Forum for Cultural Engagement, Beyond Classical Theatre. She spent nine years on the Board of MassCreative and received the Margaret Stewart Lindsay Inspiration

Award from Boston's Social Innovation Forum.

Roy Chen

Playwright

Roy Chen is a writer, playwright, and translator. He was born in 1980 in Tel-Aviv, Israel, where he lives with his wife and son. Chen is the author of the novel Great Uproar, (2023) and Souls, which has been translated with great success into Italian (Anime, Giuntina, 2022) and Russian (Души, Phantom Press, 2021) and these days are being translated to English and other languages. Since 2007 he is the house playwright of Gesher Theater (Jaffa), where his plays are staged, among them: Someone Like Me, In the Tunnel, Floating Island, The Odyssey, and more. In 2024 Chi Come Me in Milan, State of Affairs in Hamburg. Chen translated classic fiction novels and over 40 plays from Russian, French and English to Hebrew by Pushkin, Dostoevsky, Bunin, Gogol, Kharms, Moliere, Anouilh, Robert Icke, Stephen King and in 2023 he published a new translation to Milne's classic Winnie the Pooh. Chen is the recipient of many awards including: S.Y. Agnon Prize for Literature (2023), Rosenblum Performing Arts Award by the city of Tel Aviv (2022), The Prime Minister's Prize for Hebrew Literary Works (2022), Yitzhak Navon Ministry of Culture and Sports Award for the Preservation and, Cultivation of Israeli Cultures. Dramaturg & Adaptation

Rachel Merrill Moss is a practitioner and scholar whose research focuses on performances of Jewishness in Poland, and Visiting Assistant Professor of Theater and Jewish Studies at Colgate University. She held a Fulbright research fellowship to Poland (2018-2019) and was awarded the 2022 New Scholars Prize by the International Federation for Theatre Research. Rachel is co-editor with Debra Caplan of The Dybbuk Century: The Jewish Play that Possessed the World (University of Michigan Press, 2023). As a practitioner, Rachel has worked as a freelance dramaturg and theatre critic in New York City, as well as in producing and management in commercial off-Broadway theatre. In December 2020, she cocreated and facilitated Dybuk na stulecie, an online and Warsaw-based centenary celebration in honor of S. Anski's The Dybbuk, in partnership with Poland's Instytut Teatralny. Most recently, Rachel served as the dramaturg for Our Class, directed by Igor Golyak (BAM Fisher Jan-Feb 2024)

Sasha Ageeva

Costume & Props Design

Sasha Ageeva is a Belgrade-based artist, a costume designer. Originally from a small town in the central part of Russia. She started her journey as a costume assistant, which helped her gain an understanding of all the practical nuances of the profession. She has worked at the Meyerhold Art Center, the Stanislavsky Electro Theater, the Theater on Malaya Bronnaya, as well as with independent theater projects. Sasha has also worked in the film industry in several different positions. She has several short and feature films to her credit. In Belgrade, Sasha joined Balkanic Media film production team and is working on various feature films and TV series. No matter what themes or scales she encounters in her work, her goal is to accurately convey the characters through their costumes, to reveal their true nature, while carefully

interacting with the actors' personalities.
